Thank you for such a positive response to last month's article on intestinal parasites.

We have been busy the last month with meeting after meeting.

We met with a group of Doctors from the University of San Marcos here in Lima. San Marcos, a very respected, old medical college here in Peru, has been training doctors for over 500 years.

They have agreed to assist us with a pre-Albendazole survey, which should identify the severity of the worm infection prior to this campaign, and with a post campaign survey we can document the effects of our work here in Peru.

After a meeting with the Ministry of Health, we received their endorsement as well.

We have traveled to numerous areas to meet with many of the pastors instructing them how to use the training material. We have also explained how the distribution is to be completed. Pastors are our front line people for distributing the pills and they are the hygiene teachers as well. Everyone we have talked to is very excited about this project. They have begun asking for our help with other felt needs like clean water.

On June 3, 2006 we will distribute two million Albendazole tablets across Peru while we minister to the body and the spirit at the same time.

Please pray that all will go smoothly and that we will minister in a manner pleasing to our Lord.

Rotary Well Drilling Project

We will be ordering the drilling machine soon. Next we will be busy training our Peruvian team to drill the wells and getting the money needed for pumps, tanks, plumbing, wiring and transportation.

It is a never-ending cycle of challenge. We are so glad that God is bigger than any challenge.

Soy Milk Project

As many of you may remember, we have been working with the Kiwanis Clubs, Floyd Technical High School and Chesley Chambers to develop an appropriate tech soybean cooker for soymilk production. This project is nearing completion as well!

Chesley Chambers and his students have completed production of a second model. This model is easily transported and can be wood fired making it an appropriate tech machine. After testing it in the shop at Floyd Technical High School, it appears to be a success!!

The idea is to produce soymilk with a cooker fired by any material that is readily available in the villages we work in. Wood, cow chips, LP gas, natural gas or diesel fuel will heat this cooker to the correct temperature for converting soy mash into soymilk and okara fiber.

Chesley sent Jeff the sketches of this cooker and Jeff has a welding shop here in Lima working on it right now.

Chesley and one of his students will be traveling to Peru in June, 2006 to demonstrate the cooker that they built and compare it to the Peruvian model. We will then train a Peruvian team to demonstrate the soy machines in the 24 different states of Peru.

We want to give special thanks to all who have made this project possible so far. We will be making milk available where there has been no milk before.
